



## Verifying Citizenship/Identity and/or Immigration Status

### Examples of How to Prove U.S. Citizenship and Identity

Proof must be an original document. Do not mail original documents. Bring them to the office.

- Column A proves both citizenship and identity.

If you don't have a document from column A, you will need to provide documents from column B.

- Column B requires a document from both Part 1 and Part 2 to meet the requirement.

Proves both Citizenship and Identity	Part 1	Part 2

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• U.S. passport</li> <li>• Certification of Naturalization</li> <li>• Documentation of membership or affiliation issued by a federally recognized Indian Tribe</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Official birth certificate issued by the county or state</li> <li>• Medical record showing U.S. place of birth</li> <li>• Other acceptable proof of citizenship</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Driver's license or ID card from the Department of Transportation</li> <li>• School photo ID</li> <li>• School, day care or medical records (for children)</li> <li>• Military ID or dependent card</li> <li>• Other acceptable proof of ID</li> </ul>

### Examples of How to Prove Immigration Status

- Arrival Departure Record in foreign passport (I-94)
- Arrival/Departure Record
- Certificate of Citizenship
- Certificate of Eligibility for Exchange Visitor
- Certificate of Eligibility for Nonimmigrant Student Status
- Employment Authorization Card
- Foreign passport
- Machine Readable Immigrant Visa (with temporary I-551 language)
- Permanent Resident Card
- Reentry permit
- Refugee travel document
- Temporary I-551 Stamp (on passport or I-94/I-94a)
- Other acceptable proof immigration status
