IOWA CHILD CARE SHARED SERVICES

November 2023

BACKGROUND

The Iowa Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) is implementing a multi-phase Shared Services project with assistance from Opportunities Exchange (OppEx). This work is in response to the Governor's Child Care Task Force Report (November 2021).

The multi-phase Shared Services project includes:

- Funding providers' monthly child care management system (CCMS) software license fees for either brightwheel or Playground;
- Financial management coaching to help providers use data collected in the CCMS system to monitor and manage their programs;
- Technology grants to support providers' implementation of brightwheel or Playground;
- Building 'data bridges' to connect CCMS data to KinderTrack (KT) and other data systems through an Operational Data Store (ODS);
- Identifying and sharing information about the current supply and demand for child care by child age categories; and
- ▶ Funding two Shared Services Alliances.


PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

Provider Use of Child Care Management System (CCMS) Software and Participation in Financial Management Coaching

It has been one year since the implementation of the CCMS and we are happy to see the continued growth in the number of child care programs engaging in this initiative.

This includes financial management coaching, state-funded monthly licenses for either brightwheel or Playground (child care management system software) and technology grants to support the program's software implementation.

New Video Released: Two Programs Share Their Experiences

Benefits shared include time savings on administrative tasks based on reduced duplicative work, reduced paperwork, and streamlined processes. The time savings has allowed both programs more time to plan child curriculum. Both Mason and Canafax share the positive outcome of increased parent engagement and how parents are updated on their child's activities in their programs throughout the day. The video also features interviews with financial business coach, Krystal Frank with the Child Care Collaborative of Iowa, and Ryan Page, HHS Director of Child Care.

Iowa's Implementation of Innovative Technology Strategies Showcased Nationally

lowa was showcased as a national leader at the 2023 National Shared Services Technical Conference. Julie Allison, HHS Child Care Bureau Chief, shared the plenary stage with Louise Stoney, Opportunities Exchange, and representatives from the states of Arizona and Indiana. Iowa's work was represented in two pre-conference sessions and four conference sessions including the highest attended session titled, "Everything, Everywhere, All at Once: How Iowa is transforming the ECE sector with Technology," which aligned with the issue brief released by Stoney.

Naming Iowa's Operational Data Store

Work continues in building lowa's Operational Data Store (ODS) which will be maintained at lowa State University. An ODS is a term used in the technology industry to describe a secure, centralized data exchange that moves



specific data in and out of multiple sources. lowa's ODS now has a name, "Child Care Connect" or "C3."

C3 will connect:

- Parents to providers in their area that have open child care slots based on the child's age;
- The child care programs' data systems to other state data systems to reduce redundant data entries in multiple systems (i.e., the Child Care Assistance Program); and
- Communities and the State to real-time child care supply and demand data to inform decision making.
