Dear Child Care Provider,

This letter is in regards to the September 15, 2015 compliance check of your Level B, Registered Child Development Home. Iowa Code Chapter 237A and 441 Iowa Administrative Code, Chapter 110, describes specific requirements that must be met by a Registered Child Development Home.

The following areas were out of compliance at the time of my visit:

441 IAC 110.5(2) A provider file is maintained and contains:

441 IAC 110.5(2)“a” A physician’s examination report for the provider and all members of the household . Acceptable physical examinations shall be documented on Form 470-5152, Child Care Provider Physical Examination Report. The examination shall include any necessary testing for communicable diseases; a discussion of recommended vaccinations; completed no more than six months prior to initial registration; completed by a licensed medical doctor, doctor of osteopathy, physician assistant or advanced registered nurse practitioner; and repeated at least every three years.

One out of three family members was missing this in the file. Please make sure to use form 470-5152 for all family members.

441 IAC 110.5(9) The provider shall meets the following requirements:

- a. Gives careful supervision at all times.
- b. Exchange information with the parent of each child frequently to enhance the quality of care.
- c. Give consistent, dependable care and be capable of handling emergencies
- d. Be present at all times except when emergencies occur or an absence is planned, at which time care shall be provided by a department-approved substitute. When an absence is planned, the provider shall give parents at least 24 hours’ prior notice.

The provider child care hours of operation is from 3 PM to 8 AM M-F and on the weekend days. The provider has an overnight policy. DHS field compliance worker suggests provider add the following information into the policy to ensure proper supervision during the overnight hours.

- Are emergency drills being practiced during overnight care?
- Include 1-2 more times that the provider is checking on the children during the overnight hours.

- Is the caretaker using a monitor or other electronic device such as video monitor, motion detector, alarms, etc. to monitor the children? How is the caretaker prepared to handle power outages or dead batteries? The provider may want to obtain a monitoring device in the home or alarms on the doors.
- How is the caretaker prepared to monitor for fire, damaging storms, or other disasters? Do they have a weather radio or alert system?

441 IAC 110.9(1) SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS FOR CHILD DEVELOPMENT HOME CATEGORY “B”

The provider was in compliance with the number of children she can care for as a registered Category B child development home. This information is included for informational purposes only.

441 IAC 110.9(1)“a” No more than six children not attending kindergarten or a higher grade level shall be present at any one time

441 IAC 110.9(1)“b” Of these six children, not more than four children who are 24 months of age or younger shall be present at any one time. Of these four children, no more than three may be 18 months of age or younger.

441 IAC 110.9(1)“c” In addition to the six children not in school, no more than four children who attend school may be present

441 IAC 110.9(1)“d” In addition to these ten children, no more than two children who are receiving care on a part-time basis may be present.

441 IAC 110.9(1)“e” No more than 12 children shall be present at any one time when an emergency school closing is in effect.

44 1 IAC 110.9(1)“f” If more than eight children are present at any one time for a period of more than two hours, the provider shall be assisted by a department-approved assistant who is at least 14 years old

Suggestions for Improvement:

DHS field compliance worker strongly encourages the provider to maintain contact with CCRR representative. It is recommended the provider have CCRR to the home to review Checklist for Child Development Home Registration and to review changes to policy and rules. DHS field compliance expects the provider to be up to date with changes in policy and rules for Registered Child Development homes.

Non-compliance with any of the mandated regulatory requirements listed above may lead to the cancellation or revocation of your Child Development Home Registration. **Please take whatever steps are necessary to completely address each of the violations noted above. It is essential you correct all above-mentioned violations.**

Based on the items out of compliance listed above, a recheck or follow up visit to your home is not necessary. However, it is essential you provide documentation to the Department that certifies you have corrected each of the identified regulatory violations and are now in complete compliance with all Departmental regulatory mandates. **Please check mark each of the boxes listed above when the necessary corrections have been completed. By doing so, you certify that you have completed all of the mandated regulatory requirements contained within each identified section.**

I certify that I have taken all of the steps necessary to correct each of the identified violations noted above and am now in complete compliance with all of the Departmental mandated regulatory rules.
