Dear Child Care Provider,

This letter is in regards to the November 20, 2015 compliance check of your Level B, Registered Child Development Home. Iowa Code Chapter 237A and 441 Iowa Administrative Code, Chapter 110, describes specific requirements that must be met by a Registered Child Development Home. The following areas were out of compliance at the time of my visit:

- 441 IAC 110.5(1) Conditions in the home are safe, sanitary, and free of hazards.
- 441 IAC 110.5(1)“j” Emergency plans in case of man-made or natural disaster shall be written and posted by the primary and secondary exits. The plans shall clearly map building evacuation routes and tornado and flood shelter areas.

Findings: At the time of my inspection there were no emergency plans posted. You stated the door had just been painted so the signs were taken down. Be sure to put the signs back up right away.

- 441 IAC 110.5(2) A provider file is maintained and contains:
- 441 IAC 110.5(2)“a” A physician’s examination report for the provider and all members of the household . Acceptable physical examinations shall be documented on Form 470-5152, Child Care Provider Physical Examination Report. The examination shall include any necessary testing for communicable diseases; a discussion of recommended vaccinations; completed no more than six months prior to initial registration; completed by a licensed medical doctor, doctor of osteopathy, physician assistant or advanced registered nurse practitioner; and repeated at least every three years.

Findings: Need a Child Care Provider Physical Examination form for Scotlynn, Roman, Riley and Katie. I have attached one copy of the form. You will need to make additional copies.

- 441 IAC 110.5(2)“b” (1) Certificates or training verification and record check documentation.

Within the first three months of registration :

Two hours of approved child abuse and neglect mandatory reporter training (and every 5 years thereafter.)

Findings: Katie's child abuse mandatory reporter training was due 11/14/15. Please provide documentation of completion.

441 IAC 110.5(2)“d” An individual file is maintained for each substitute and contains:

(3) Certification of two hours of approved training relating to identification and reporting of child abuse within 6 months of employment and repeated every 5 years.

(4) Certification in infant and child first aid that includes mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. If they are unable to locate first aid training that includes mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, they must complete both a first aid course and CPR.

Findings: Need documentation that Sarah has completed CPR and first-training.

Non-compliance with any of the mandated regulatory requirements listed above may lead to the cancellation or revocation of your Child Development Home Registration. **Please take whatever steps are necessary to completely address each of the violations noted above. It is essential you correct all above-mentioned violations within the next 45 days which is January 17, 2016.**

Based on the items out of compliance listed above, you will be required to have a recheck or follow up visit to your home.
